

When I open my folder of animated signature files, all I see are icons. I used to see the pictures of them. How can I see the pictures again? After much speculation, Jim looked up the answer and it worked! In the folder, select FILE EXPLORER OPTIONS from the menu. In the FILE EXPLORER OPTIONS window, click on the VIEW tab. Uncheck ALWAYS SHOW ICONS, NEVER THUMBNAILS option.

Chris may be interested in purchasing a new mini PC but read they have some heat issues. Bill J said, yes, they used to have heat issues but he doesn't think they do any more. Mini PCs generally have the same

parts as a computer such as a processor, memory, storage, an operating system, and computer ports. What they don't have is a cooling system, real-time clock, or physical interface.

They don't come with a keyboard, mouse, or speakers. What uses do they have? They're great for a home theater, digital signage, as TV boxes, gaming, medical settings, home offices, as a second pc, a media center, school, portable workstation, or to be used as a server.

Julia has an old MacBook hard drive. How can she access the contents? She sees the icon but Bill J says she needs to reconfigure it.

Louise asks if she should archive her photos and if so, where do they go? Google Photos archive is a way to hide your photos without deleting them. You can send any image from your library to the archive and it will stay in cloud storage for as long as you want them to. Archived images will still appear in Google Photos search results, so archiving won't affect your

ability to use Google's search tools to locate specific images. To locate them, look in your AR-CHIVE folder.

What is Google One? Google One is a subscription plan that gives you more storage to use across Google Drive, Gmail, and Google Photos. One advantage is you can share your membership with your family.

Don would like to change some information in the "About

WAUC" paragraph on Groups.io but doesn't know how. Again, much discussion and many suggestions. Log in to Groups and go to the group's website. Locate the message you want to edit. Click on the hamburger menu at the lower right of the message. In the popup menu, select EDIT MESSAGE. On the EDIT MESSAGE part, make your changes.

Chris lives on three levels. Does he need a mesh router? Bill recommends a Linux, Asus, or Net Gear. He said to be sure to get Wi-Fin 6 and 6e capabilities.

How can you protect your phone from hackers? Lock your phone. Keep your software updated. Back up your data to the Google cloud. Set up help in finding your phone. We watched a short video on, "Find My Device."

To back up your phone to Google, go to SETTINGS, select GOOGLE, and tap BACK UP NOW.

To ensure your phone can be found, make sure you are signed into your Google account. Have LOCATION turned on, have FIND MY DEVICE turned on, and have STORE RECENT LOCATION turned on. When STORE RECENT LOCATION is on, you can find your device even when it's off. Create a 2-STEP VERIFICATION CODE. Be connected to Wi-Fi.

Did you wonder what IMEI was? IMEI (International Mobile Equipment Identity) is a 15-17-digit code that is given to every mobile phone. This number is used by service providers to uniquely identify valid devices. Specifically, IMEI code can enable a Global System for Mobile communication (GSM) or Universal Mobile Telecommunications Service (UMTS) network to prevent a misplaced or stolen phone from initiating calls. IMEI is also a part of mobile device management.

A number of members greatly enjoy the MobilityWare Solitaire game but are annoyed with all the ads. Some of them seem longer that most ads too. Kathy recommended to turn your Wi-Fi OFF while

trouble emailing his cousin in Minnesota from his Kindle Fire. It's in his SENT file but it doesn't go through. If he sends it from Dolores' iPhone, it goes right through. We think somehow his email address on his Kindle Fire got messed up. He should ask his cousin to send him an email so he can reply to it.

Louise D purchased MS Office Pro 2021 from StackSocial.com for her Mac. She didn't' install it within the 30 days required and now it won't install. She would like to purchase it again but thought it was out of stock. PC Sales offers if for \$50, PC Masters for \$38, but neither of them have the Mac version. We found Best Digitals Products had the Mac version for \$50 and StackSocial.com had MS Home & Business for Mac 2021 for \$30 and she was pleased with that.

Hewie recommended we use the website ScamAdvisor.com to check websites to see if they're reliable. Since a number of members have purchased this deal through StackSocial.com, we feel safe in recommending it.

Karen uses the app Fetch, which created by a group in Madison. Fetch gives you points for

shopping and submitting your receipts with the app. You can then use



those points to redeem gift cards from a wide variety of your favorite retailers and restaurants! She uses it and has received numerous gift cards. Deb also uses it and recommends it.

Bill J recommends Microsoft Bing Rewards. Sign in to your Microsoft account and search on Bing to keep putting points on the board. When you level up, you'll earn faster! You can even boost your earning by searching Bing on mobile, on Edge, and in Windows 10. They also have daily offers, weekly quizzes, and daily quizzes to help you earn additional points which you can convert to dollars. Bill V is having more problems with Mail for Windows. Sometimes he gets emails that are all jumbled and other times the emails just don't show up on his PC. It works perfectly on his iPhone though. Bill J said he has also experienced the jumbled emails. Both also have Yahoo accounts. Hewie suggest checking settings on their computers. Brian says the problem is with Yahoo. Yahoo Mail is set up to use in a browser. Open your browser, go

to Yahoo, and read your emails there. Mail for Windows isn't interpreting the information correctly. He recommends using Gmail. Gmail will bring in all your email from your other accounts (up to 5 accounts) for free. Follow these steps:

> Click on the (settings icon) See all SETTINGS

Click on the heading ACCOUNTS AND IMPORT Click on IMPORT MAIL AND CONTACTS

Enter the accounts you want to import from Gmail calls folders LABELS.

J J recommends 2 videos he found very useful: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=fDdeeMCMJ1c and https://www.youtube.com/watch? v=ocqvRdcM pk

February 2023 **Tablet/Smartphone SIG**

Julia Rice, Jim Hempel, Don Gardner, Jan Mlagan, JJ Johnson, Romaine Artus, Kathy Mueller, Louise Bozek, Chris Nance, Rita Bruce, Louise Dahms, Richard Durand, Donna Armitage, Brian Behling, Marcia Zientek, and Dale Voit were in attendance this evening.

We started the meeting hearing that Louise just learned how to use the Chat box and pasted a cartoon into it to provide us all with a laugh.

Then we talked about a mystery. My Samsung Note 10 screen was showing on my PC screen and I could share it for all to see. But it was not connected to Zoom as it had been in the past. No wires either. Some suggested it was through the Windows app, Phone Link. I showed what that looks like and it was a lot different. It was a large popup that allowed me to go to my Messages, Photos and even Notifications.

The image of my Note 10 screen was exactly that, a view on Zoom of the screen. And unlike in the past when I had to tap on my actual phone to change views, I could use the mouse to tap on the image of the phone and it would change views. While it is still a mystery to me, I have a hunch it is due to an app on my PC called Samsung DeX.



The website for this app states "Multitask between devices like a boss. Connect your Galaxy to your monitor or TV to bring it to life on the big screen. And now, with just a USB cable, unlock your phone's possibilities on PC through Samsung DeX." It sounds to me like this could be involved. More study is needed since I wasn't using a cable as they stated.

Richard had accidentally deleted a download on his phone and wanted to know if there was a way to retrieve it. We suggested he look in his Trash folder. I demonstrated how he could open up the File Manager app and look for it. He tried this but

couldn't find Trash. Then we suggested he look in the Deleted folder on his phone. He will try that. Louise told us she uses an app called Finder to help locate items on her phone. A quick search on Google offered many other suggestions to help locate lost items.

For a little fun, we played a trivia game on our knowledge of the 80's and we all did very well.

Julia asked about WhatsApp. It is an app that is similar to Skype, Zoom, and other video conferencing apps. Many people outside the US will use this app. It has some pros and cons. For one thing, both parties must have the app on their device. All communications are encrypted for improved security. It is available in the Google Play Store and other locations depending on the device you want to use — Android, Apple, Windows, or Mac. In the US, our phones all come with a Message app, so that has become the default standard here.

Julia mentioned her Google Play Store and other apps were missing. We suggested she turn off her device and restart it. She did. It worked.

On to screenshots. The various manufacturers have found multiple ways to take a screenshot. We suggested searching for that based on the model phone you used. On my Samsung, we looked at two ways. One was to press the Volume down button and the Power button at the same time. Another way is to make a flat hand, like you were chopping with it then move the edge of your hand over the screen face, right to left. This one can take some practice to get the right speed and motion.

Our next topic was the popular ChatGPT. JJ offered some suggestions for using it, such as starting a free account with your name and email, then try using it and asking specific questions. You will also be asked to provide feedback on the information you receive. This is to help the developers improve it's accuracy. He gave an example of asking for a 500 word article on a specific topic. JJ showed how it is used and noted that at this time, it uses information from 2021 and older. Prior to the meeting, I asked it to provide 10 points for a tutorial on smartphones. I've also used it to ask about cameras on our devices. Later we used this information to discuss our Camera app.

Louise B asked about a website she uses for information on television scheduled programming. She

used Titan TV Guide but lately it has been misbehaving. So we took a look at it. TitanTV.com is the free TV listing guide site television viewers nationwide rely on every day for local broadcast television stations. Channel's numbers are in the left column, the Timeline is across the top.



In case she continues to have issues with it, we suggested looking at tvtv.us which is similar.



Both of these services can be tailored to focus on a certain state/city for their information. Both Jim and JJ use these types of television schedule/ content information providers.

If an app on your smartphone seems to be misbehaving or you are no longer using it, go ahead and uninstall it. You can long press on an app icon and a popup with appear. It will give you several options, one of which is Uninstall. Android phones prevent you from having duplicates filling up your storage space. You may have done something to have two icons, but there is only one instance of the actual app. Those icons are more like shortcuts. Don't be afraid of uninstalling apps.

Going back to ChatGPT, I pulled up its response to my question on smartphone cameras and we proceeded to go through them one by one. You will be amazed at the number of adjustments and changes you can make to your picture taking. You are all aware of the Setting icon, the gear, for your basic phone settings. Did you know the Phone app has it's own Setting gear where can make the adjustments to your pictures?

Open your Camera Settings. Scroll through and learn more about them. If you don't understand some of them, ask at our next meeting or search for more info. Pictures can be changed and edited in the Camera and/or the Gallery apps.

For example, this is what appears on the top of my screen, in the Camera app. From left to right, we have



trol which will open a popup for more choices, the timer for time delay before snapping the photo, the control for the aspect ratio with choices from a square picture, to 3 by 4 like old television sets, to 9 by 16. The next one with arrowhead will turn on motion photo. This takes about 2 seconds of video. And, the last one for a popup of filters and other options.

Richard asked if there was a way to overlay several pictures into one. No one was aware of a way to do this in the Camera or Gallery apps. There may be other apps or computer programs that could do this. Kathy mentioned she uses Remaster to remove scratches and other small defects on pictures of her parents.

We ended the meeting with some comments from Kathy. She is having some issues with her Facebook account. She doesn't have a phone number connected with it and can't get in because of this. She has tried twice and it kicks her out. We didn't have any suggestions and she may have to set up a new account. She also commented that adding a + sign to your Gmail address can no longer be used. You will get an error message.

You used to be able to append a plus ("+") sign and any combination of words or numbers after your email address. For example, if your name was hikingfan@gmail.com, you could send mail to hikingfan+friends@gmail.com or hiking-fan+mailinglists@gmail.com. Looks like this is no longer available.

Balloons Over the US - Did you know.....

If you have been isolated in a cabin in the woods with no electricity recently, you may have missed the latest viral posts on social media and in the news on tv. A very large balloon was spotted drifting over the US, powered by solar arrays and heading east. It managed to make it to the Atlantic Ocean before it was shot down by the USAF. But did you know this wasn't the first such very large balloon drifting over us?

Ten years ago, way back in 2013, a project was started by another entity. It was a groundbreaking



achievement. They had developed an amazing new fabric that could be used on large balloons in the near space atmosphere and drift over the US at more than 60,000 feet. This design team had no trouble putting these sustaining flights at these altitudes. In fact, at one time there were over a dozen of these

large balloons in the air at the same time.

One of them was even documented to have circumnavigated the entire globe. Yes, around the world. And not once, but it went around 14 times traveling over 2,500,000 miles in the near space atmosphere. They were even able to steer themselves by taking advantage of their AI powered predictions of wind currents they got from government weather data. With all this data, the balloon could change altitude to take advantage of different wind conditions and directions.

This project, designated Loon, was discontinued in 2021, after successfully accomplishing its mission. The entity behind this aimed to provide internet access to



underserved regions via these stratospheric balloons. While very successful technology, by this time, .. its mission was being accomplished by other means, such as wireless telephones, new satellites, and extended ground based wired systems. When the plug was pulled on the project, this entity produced a 432 page detailing called the Loon Library with data on over 2000 flights along with technical details.

Who could be behind this project? Was it China? Can you guess who was behind it? The answer is at the end of this newsletter.

Answer

The person behind the Loon project is Mike Cassidy, an employee of Alphabet, the parent company of Google, working in conjunction with Raven Aerostar. Aerostar had decades of extensive experience in balloon technology. If you care to read more about this, check out
