

Google Meet (formerly Duo) is an easy way to stay

connected with family and friends. I use it



very frequently to talk and see (on the phone) my daughter, son-in-law, and little granddaughters in Texas. It's Google's version of Apple's Face-time. To use, go to your CONTACTS list and tap on the Meet icon. That will paste a link in a text message to your contact. Send the text and the next thing you know you will receive a Meet call from your contact. Tap on ACCEPT and there you are.

Once we were all primed to learn, we got down to

the nitty-gritty of learning about how to make photos better with simple Google Photo editing tips. Chris, of Geeks-on-Tour showed us just how easy editing photos



Google One is a subscription plan that gives you more storage to use across Google Drive, Gmail, and Google Photos. With the free plan you receive 15GB free storage, with One membership you get 100 GB. With Google One you get access to "Google Experts." Think of them as premium tech support staff, available 24/7. Google One users can share their storage space with up to five

additional family members. They can back up their entire phone data that includes messages,



photos, videos, and data. Users can restore backup-up data to their new device by clicking on the RESTORE option during the Android setup process. Members are able to use the premium tools to edit their pictures in Google Photos. Magic Eraser is one of those tools. Just recently Google One also extended VPN services to all subscribers. If you subscribe to Google One you could get up to 40% off selected hotels when you search for hotels while signed in to the Google account associated with your Google One membership. So, what does it all cost? \$1.99 per month or \$19.99 per year. To Explore Google One, its benefits, and to sign up go to: https://one.google.com/about/benefits. Should any of your information appear on the "Dark Web", Google One will notify you. Some of us participate in Google Opinion Rewards and that money can be used for Google One, not too shabby.


Open Google Photos, and select a picture. Tap on the



EDIT icon and you will see additional tools. You should see DYNAMIC, PORTRAIT, ENHANCE, COLOR POP, and B & W POP. Below that you will see SUGGESTIONS, CROP, TOOLS, ADJUST, FILTERS, MARKUP, and MORE. If you tap

TOOLS, above you will see MAGIC ERASER, BLUR, PORTRAIT LIGHT, and COLOR FOCUS. So, in Google


Photos what are the premium tools included in Google One?
Magic Eraser,
Portrait Light,
Color Pop, Color Focus and Portrait Blur. The premium tools



have a little 1 in a circle beside the tool.

So let's dissect some of these tools. After tapping EDIT, Chris encourages us to experiment. Touch the various tools and see what appeals to us. Portrait light will adjust the position and light brightness. Blur

adds a background blur to
your picture.
You are able to
adjust the depth
and blur intensity by sliding
your finger on
the numbers
shown below.
Tap ENHANCE
and let Photos
make tweaks to



improve your picture. Tap COLOR POP and compare the two photos. Which one do you like best? One of the favorites was Magic Eraser. Just take your finger and trace around what you would like removed, tap Magic Eraser and voila! The object you traced is gone.

Add text to your photo by tapping on Markup, then Pen, Highlighter, or Text. Choose one of the seven color options and add your text.

There are so many options; brightness, contrast, saturation, tint, sharpen, denoise (the process of removing digital noise from a picture), and vignette (creates a setting with its imagery). Whatever changes you make to your photos, be sure to tap SAVE COPY.

Click on the GEAR icon in the upper right hand corner and select SETTINGS. Click the LABELS tab, and under SYSTEM label locate ALL MAIL and click on SHOW. ALL MAIL will show up at the left of your screen.

Jan recently updated Zoom. Now every time she boots up her computer she gets a message in a box asking for a link to Zoom. CTRL + ALT + DEL brings up the TASK MANAGER. HIGHLIGHT ZOOM

in the
START
MENU,
click on
DISABLE.

In the past members have asked for sites to help them locate people. ThatsThem.com is a free people search service. Since no one volunteered their name to search, I used mine. My date of birth, age, address, phone number and email address were all listed correctly. It listed my daughter's age as 57 (she's 40), various IP Addresses,



gave Wealth, Donor, and Travel scores which none of us had any clues about, said I

was single (I'm married for 55 years), and various other incorrect information. Julia was then curious what information was there about her. We

checked and all had a good laugh as it said Julia was Protestant. She's been a School Sister of St. Francis since the age of 17.

Louise B said she would like to find a site where she could connect a VIN with a name or address. Interestingly a few members knew their VINs. We tried various sites but nothing connected anything with anyone until we looked up JJ's personalized license plate on FAX VIN. Up came all the information of his new car including all the accessories.

Next we learned how to decode your VIN (Vehicle Identification Number). Did you know VIN's starting



with 1, 4, and 5 are manufactured in the United States. The third number

of letter is used by the vehicle manufacturer to identify what kind of vehicle it is: car, truck, bus, etc. The 10th character indicates the model year. Much more information on decoding your VIN is located online. This is about the extent we were interested in learning.

If you save your passwords in your browser, you are able to see them by opening your browser, in this

example we are opening Chrome. Look for your PASSWORDS ICON, which looks like a key. If you don't see the icon, click on the three vertical dots in the upper-right corner and choose SETTINGS, then AUTOFILL, and PASSWORD MANAGER. Your saved passwords should be listed.

How to limit your Android smartphone battery us-



age for apps you don't often use: SETTINGS/ BATTERY AND DEVICE CARE/press BATTERY/ press BACKGROUND USAGE LIMITS/toggle PUT UNUSED APPS TO SLEEP to ON.

Another tip for both Android and iPhones is to update your EMERGENCY BYPASS CONTACT. When



you enable Emergency Bypass for a specific contact, they can reach out to you even while you're on do not disturb mode.

You can enable this feature for phone and FaceTime calls and text messages separately. Open the CONTACTS app. Select the contact you want to set for EMERGENCY BYPASS. Tap on the EDIT button to edit the contact's details. Scroll down and look for the EMERGENCY BYPASS OPTION. TOGGLE the switch to enable EMERGENCY BYPASS for that contact.

One last Android tip: How to turn on the edge

panel lights on phones with that feature. SETTINGS/
NOTIFICATIONS/NOTIFICATION
POP-UP STYLE. Tap EDGE LIGHTING STYLE, then select your desired effect such as Basic, Bubble,
or Heart. You can test them by
tapping each one. Once selected,

tap COLOR, and select your de-



sired color. Then, tap ADVANCED to select your desired transparency, width, and duration. Tap DONE when finished. It's a fun personalization in you're so inclined.

AUGUST 2023 SMARTPHONE/TABLET SIG

We started off with a question about thermal printers, what they are, how they work and why don't we use more of them. We learned Thermal printers do



not use ink or toner, which can save cost over time, but they are generally only black and white printing. The savings from that can justify the higher price and cost of thermal paper. Thermal printers do not

break as often as regular printers due to their simple design and no moving parts, so the chance it breaks and you'll have to replace it is much lower. But they have a number of disadvantages. You need to purchase thermal paper, they have color limitations, thermal prints fade over time, and print heads can get damaged by heat and they are expensive to replace. You will find these often used for labeling or cash registers type printouts. Thermal paper costs about \$28 for 200 sheets vs 500 sheets of paper at Walmart goes for about \$5.

Richard mentioned he has issues with his Kindle Fire 8. After a few questions about the basics, like do you have a charged battery, we learned the screen is cracked or somehow broken. All he gets are horizontal lines. We deemed its condition to be terminal, kaput, fried, ready for the e-recycle bin.

Jim mentioned the Moto G Stylus is at its lowest price ever. It usually sells for about \$400 and is now going for \$270. A stylus is quite handy. In many respects

this phone is similar to the way the Samsung Note 10 operates.

Jan often uses the speaker phone when talking on her phone. She said that the screen will black out and wondered how to keep it lit. It blacks out automatically to save battery power. The time it takes to blackout is adjustable in Settings. On most phones, just touching the black screen or tapping the Power button will cause the screen to light up.



Kathy Mueller donated a 1 TB external hard drive, USB 2.0, My Book, Western Digital to be raffled at the Christmas party. More de-

tails to follow.

Then we moved on to the first of our planned videos for the night. In this meeting we covered four topics. Each topic started with a short video which was no more than about 10 minutes each. After watching each video we moved on to either a discussion or hands-on with your own phone.

This first video had to do with sleeping apps vs deep sleeping apps. To kick off the discussion we watched this 6 minute video called Sleeping Apps

vs Deep sleeping apps the Differences and Benefits, narrated by Jimmy is Promo. It can be viewed in its entirety at this URL.

The main difference is that Sleeping apps will receive app updates automatically and will send notifications to your phone. Deep sleeping apps are disabled and will not run in the phone background. Also, they will not receive updates through Play Store or send notifications on a mobile phone. You can start them normally and when you are done using them, they will go back into deep sleep thus saving on battery usage. Control of these features are usually found in Device Care in your Settings.

From there we went on to the second video of the evening. This one is just over 9 minutes and is titled 13 Android Battery Setting You Need to Change Now. It's by Payette Forward, David and

David presenting. The entire video can be found at this URL. https://www.youtube.com/watch? v=OfMdQVOfdmc

The 13 tips that are discussed in detail in the video include the following: I have also included the time stamp in the video. While watching the whole video is best, these time stamps will let you easily make your selection: It starts with Choosing the right network type, such as 4G vs 5G (0:10), Turn on Dark Mode (1:19), Set Motion Smoothness to Standard (1:37), Turn off Always On Display (2:16), Take control of app permissions (2:37), Turn off Bixby wake up (3:35), Turn off enhanced procession (4:17), Put unused apps to sleep (4:53), Make sure your phone is up to date (5:17), Close out your apps (6:11), Turn on adaptive battery (6:44) and finally, Put your screen in time-Out (7:32).

We discussed these tips after the video. As they mention, try them out, if you don't like their operation, it is easy to go back to your previous setting. For example, after trying these, some don't like Dark Mode, or they don't like the effect Battery Saver mode has on phone operation. Then don't use them, turn them off. The video offers tips, not rules.

The third video plays about 7 minutes and is called

Take Control of Your Notifications on Android.

Notification Panel

This video includes a short introduction followed by Quick Settings (0:10), Notification Settings (0:51), Clear notifications (1:11), Select Brief or Detailed Notifications (1:35), Included apps (2:00), Brief Pop-Up settings (2:48), Choose effect notification (3:01), Show when screen is off (3:44), Do not disturb (4:12), Calls messages and conversations (4:48), Alarms and sounds (5:10), Do not disturb apps (5:41), Hide notifications (5:52), Badges (6:26), Wrap Up (6:35)

Our next video lasted only 4 minutes. It's called Explaining Android widgets, by Android Central and narrated by Phil. You can watch the entire video at URL: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZMsqSQzV6nw

So what is a widget? It is a mini app that displays a

small amount of information on screen at all times and interacts with the user. Typical examples are of widgets are search box, clock, weather, calculator and stock market. The widget may be waiting for in-



put from the user, such as a search box, or be "live" and actively display changes like the weather and stock market. By the way, in the Windows world, a widget is often called a gadget. For more details and to find out how to put a widget on your home screen, check out this video.

All four of these videos are easy to watch, move at a nice pace and have clear, easy to understand narrators.

We actually went over time at this meeting and ended with a brief discussion of The Library of Things. Libraries of Things are adding arts and crafts equipment and supplies for use in the library or for check out. Crafting tools may include sewing machines, knitting kits, die-cutters, paper



craft tools, jewelry repair and embroidery kits, scrapbooking supplies, and button makers. Other household items are often

involved, such as baking pans, cupcake tins, etc.

A backup for the Program Chair is still needed.


