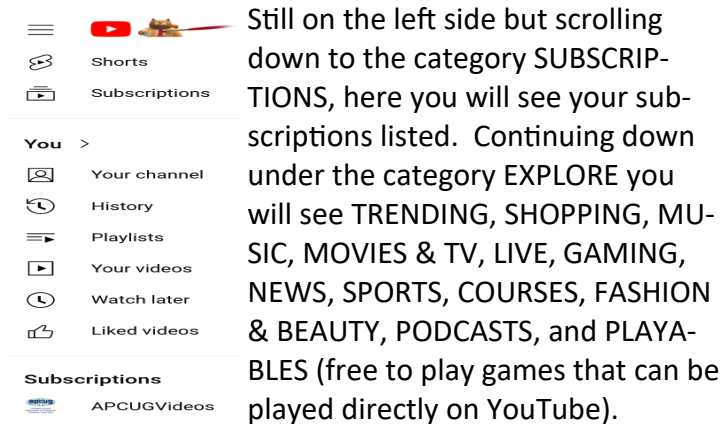

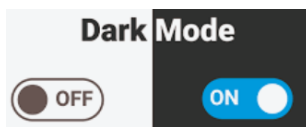
Click on the hamburger menu in the UPPER LEFT CORNER, to see HOME, SHORTS, SUBSCRIPTIONS, YOUR CHANNEL, HISTORY, PLAYLISTS, YOUR VIDEOS, WATCH LATER, and LIKED VIDEOS.



To watch a PICTURE-IN-PICTURE, (PiP) shrinks a video into a small player so you can keep watching while using other apps, hold down the ALT key and tap P.

To see the transcript of a YouTube video click on MORE at the end of the video description. More information regarding the video should appear. Look for SHOW TRANSCRIPT.

Jim prefers to use DARK MODE on his smartphone. Dark mode reduces blue light and significantly saves on battery.



It reduces the light emitted by device screens while maintaining the minimum color contrast ratios required for readability. Some PCs also offer the same mode. To activate dark mode on your smartphone go to SETTINGS, DISPLAY, toggle NIGHT MODE.

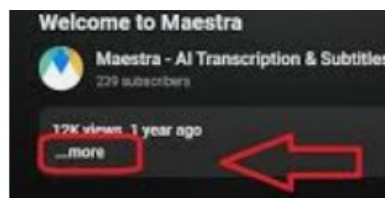
Google Photo Tip

Open up any individual image within the Photos app on your phone (or tablet or Chromebook), then swipe up on the image and tap the words, "Add a caption" — directly beneath the main menu of options.

As usual, we asked for questions at the beginning of the meeting. Since no one had any except me, I said I was still having problems finding the transcript on some



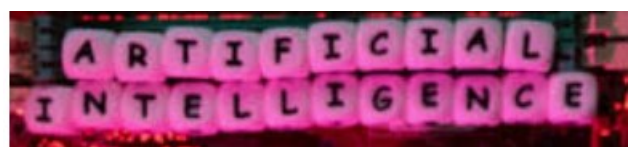
YouTube videos. After Googling the question, we found the following instructions: Navigate

to YouTube and open the video you want to access the transcript of. Locate and click the three horizontal dots below the video. They should be next to the SHARE and SAVE buttons. Clicking the dots pulls up a short menu. Click OPEN TRANSCRIPT. Be aware however that not all videos are transcribed.

Don showed us an email he recently received from Spectrum and we picked apart the email and declared it SPAM! Jim showed an email from DHL informing him he missed a package. The first thing we noticed was the sender's email addressed ended in .DE. That's the country code for Germany. More spam.



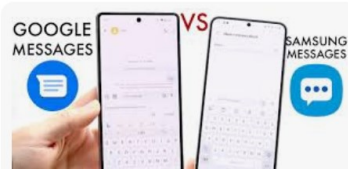
Jim played a two-minute video he made with the help of AI, depicting Wisconsin All-computer Users Club and touting all its benefits. This was an amazing video that would have taken hours to amass and edit. We were all amazed! While AI is able to take information and produce such a fabulous video, in our limited knowledge we continue to see errors that aren't the fault of the prompts. There's so much more to be learned.



Just yesterday Marcia attended a talk at Marquette University on AI given by attorneys. Their

opinion was AI is doomed to fail due to litigation and thoughts that the courts will be jammed by legal disputes.

Jim demonstrated how he uses Google Messages for texting. His phone, a Samsung S24 Ultra, comes pre-installed with both Samsung Messages and Google Messages. Both apps perform the same function but do so in a variety of different ways. Both apps allow sending images, videos, audio files, voice recordings, emojis, stickers and .GIFs. If you use Samsung Messages you must use their keyboard instead of the Gboard keyboard. It's all personal preference. I commented I liked the new colors Google Messages recently added for texts. Louise B. said she recently noticed Samsung Messages removed the .GIFs and she was really missing that feature. She was happy to find Google Messages had them as she particularly likes the Happy Birthday messages.



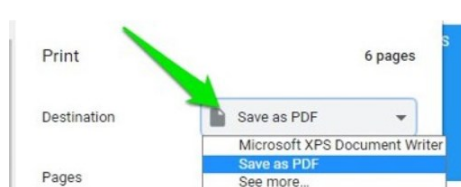
Jan noticed when she joined our Zoom meeting tonight there were icons she didn't recognize. That's because Zoom recently updated with a number of changes. To ensure your Zoom app is up to date, BE SURE YOU'RE SIGNED IN, click on your PROFILE PICTURE ICON on the top right side of the screen, scroll down to CHECK FOR UPDATES, select UPDATE. Some of the latest updates include IMMERSIVE VIEW which enables you to pull all the meeting participants into a single virtual background. Don demonstrated it last month. To enable an IMMERSIVE VIEW, click VIEW, IMMERSIVE, and select one of the pre-loaded scenes or upload your own. BLURRED BACKGROUND is nice if your environment isn't tidy. This only blurs the background, not people. To BLUR, go to SETTINGS, BACKGROUND & FILTERS, VIRTUAL BACKGROUND, then BLUR. The POWERPOINT AS VIRTUAL BACKGROUND feature gives you the ability to put a PowerPoint presentation as your background. Press SHARE SCREEN, ADVANCED (on the top middle tab of the screen), click POWERPOINT AS VIRTUAL BACKGROUND, and click SHARE. CLOSED CAPTIONS during



meetings can help improve information retention and compensate for poor audio quality. On the left side of the screen, open SETTINGS OPTIONS PANEL and click "ADMIN". Scroll down to ACCOUNT MANAGEMENT, click ACCOUNT SETTINGS from the dropdown menu, click IN MEETING (ADVANCED), toggle CLOSED CAPTIONING to ON. EXIT THE SETTINGS. SUPPRESS BACKGROUND NOISE can adjust your audio settings to compensate for background noises. Go to SETTINGS, click the arrow next to the MUTE button, from SETTINGS go to AUDIO, scroll to SUPPRESS BACKGROUND NOISE and adjust the settings to your preferences.

While looking at the YouTube site we noticed Jim had a different layout than the rest of us. There were a number of ideas offered but none were successful. Jim was going to investigate this after the meeting.

Rita opened a .PDF in her Chrome browser but her printer wouldn't print the document. She has done this in the past successfully. She uninstalled and reinstalled her printer but it still wouldn't print the document.



All the browsers will now open a .PDF. Rita was able to print the document in Edge but still no luck in Chrome. It was recommended she check her browser settings by entering the path: chrome://settings/content/pdfDocuments .

Jim showed us an interesting presentation, "The Cloud Under the Sea", by Josh Dzieza, is posted at: <https://www.theverge.com/c/24070570/internet-cables-undersea-deep-repair-ships> . It caught our attention at the first screen reading, "The internet is carried around the world by hundreds of thousands of miles of slender cables that sit at the bottom of the ocean." Submarines lay and maintain these cables laid on the seabed between land-based stations to carry



telecommunication signals across stretches of ocean and sea. There are approximately 750,000 miles of cables stretching under the water making data management much more complex. Going unnoticed by most everyone in the world, these cables underpin the entire global internet and our modern information age.



We watched a “Rossen Reports” on “How to Save on the Internet.” He recommends purchasing your own router and modem, downgrading your speed, and urges everyone to call their internet provider and negotiate a better price. If need be, ask to speak with the Customer Retention Department and inform them of other offers in your area.

Roku warns that 576,000 more users were hacked than previously though in the Mother of All Breaches (MOAB) on April 12, 2024. This was reported to WAUC members in a post on Groups.io.

Updating your apps to the latest version gives you access to the latest features and improves app security and stability. Updates frequently include performance issues and fixes any bugs that may cause crashes and other glitches. To manually update apps on your iPhone or iPad, open the APP STORE, tap your profile icon at the top of the screen, scroll to see pending updates, tap UPDATE next to an app to update or tap UPDATE ALL. On Android, open the GOOGLE PLAY STORE, at the top right tap your profile icon, tap MANAGE APPS & DEVICE. Apps with an available update are labelled UPDATE AVAILABLE, tap UPDATE.



Louise B. asked how she could back up her phone and her photos to the cloud. She previously lost all her pictures including those of her beloved dog. The easiest way to backup an Android phone is by using Google One backup services. Get the GOOGLE ONE APP from the Play Store. Open the app and at the bottom, tap STORAGE. Scroll to the DEVICE BACKUP section. Tap SET UP DATA BACKUP.



To find your backup settings, tap MANAGE BACKUP. To backup all the data on your phone, turn on DEVICE

DATA. Tap BACK UP NOW.



We finished the meeting with a document Jim found titled, Wisdom. We all enjoyed it and asked if he would post it to Groups.io.

APRIL 2024 SMARTPHONE SIG

Those attending were Jim Hempel, Don Skarda, Terry Harvey, Margaret Cortez, Julia Rice, John Schwarzmeier, Betty Robinson, Jan Mlagan, Brian Behling, Richard Durand, Rita Bruce, Lisa Ziebel, Louise Bozek, and JJ Johnson.

We started the meeting with a question from Richard. He said he downloaded a .pdf file that is in two column format, but he only wants one. Even if it was side by side, he wanted to change it to one column. We didn't know of a way to make this change in .pdf format and suggested he try opening it in Google Docs or MS Word. Once he has the document opened in one of these apps, he should be able to manipulate it to appear the way he wants to see it. In MS Word click on LAYOUT, then COLUMNS and make your selection.



Louise B. said that she has a weather app on her phone and a temperature that appears on the home screen. Often, this temperature has a different reading than if she taps on the app. The temp is likely part of a widget. It may not update after an extended period of time not being used. Like overnight. We suggested she try tapping on the temp on her screen and this should cause it to update and display the correct temperature.

Next, I opened a CNET article that contained some hot links in the text. When I clicked on it, I got a popup that asked if it should open MS Edge or go



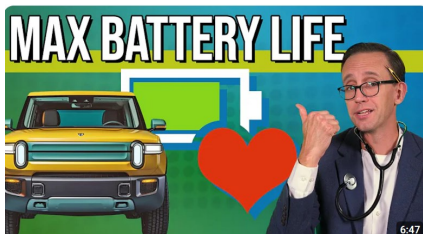
to the Play Store. They group suggested that I look to see if I had the Edge app on my phone, YES. They suggested that I delete it or uninstall it. I did that and I no longer get that popup.

In the past, there have been a lot of questions about the phone's battery. How to maintain it? How to extend its life? And so on. While I was looking at videos about electric cars (EV), I came across a simple to understand video talking about these same topics. As it turns out, EV cars use a battery technology called lithium ion.



We watched the video produced by EV Pulse. I explained this video would apply to smartphone batteries also. The main point of the video was to obtain maximum long-term life, the battery should be charged only to 80% or so. The video also covered the charge rate of lithium-ion batteries. It is not linear. That is, they charge up to 80% rapidly and then charge slower to 100%.

The video had an interesting analogy. It explained this nonlinear charging by using a movie theater that has a



line of people coming into the seating area. First the theater fills quickly since all the seats are empty. But as seats fill, people must look

longer to find an open seat. This is like the charging of lithium-ion batteries that most smartphones are using today. They get charged to 80% rather quickly and then slow down.

Jan asked another question about batteries and whether they should be kept charged. Batteries create the electrical power through a chemical reaction that takes place internally. In the case of rechargeable batteries, this chemical reaction can be reversed. There are several types of batteries being used. The most current ones are lithium ion. These have a lot of advantages over previous types. They have very low internal current leakage so they can stay charged extremely long when not being used. Previously, the most popular type was Ni-Cad, or nickel cadmium. This article goes into greater detail.

Other batteries are based on different chemicals in-

side. A popular throw away type is called alkaline. It can't be recharged – the chemical reaction can't be reversed. An older rechargeable battery was based on the Ni-Cad chemicals inside. These have totally different operating characteristics. Unused, they don't hold a charge nearly as long due to internal leakage, and several other operational factors. NiCad vs Lithium Ion: Which is battery better for cordless tools.

We got onto the subject of navigation aids in vehicles. Terry talked about Android Auto and said she could not find an app in her Android smartphone



for this. There is no icon for it on her phone. After some searching on the internet, we learned the Android Auto functionality is built into the phone's IOS, operations system. A

separate app is not needed. There are other considerations, such as, whether the vehicle could connect to Android Auto. More on that in this article. <https://support.google.com/androidauto/answer/6348190?hl=en#zippy=%2Ccheck-if-your-car-is-compatible%2Ccheck-your-usb-cable>

But what if you have an older vehicle, like my 2010 truck. No screen. No Android Auto. It is pretty basic but it does have power windows, not crank up. We looked for a work around and found a device that could be mounted on the vehicle's dashboard or windshield. Carpuride has several models. They use the 12v available in your vehicle to power them. Some models are wired. Some are wireless, using Bluetooth technology. Depending on the model, they range in price from about \$100 to \$300. Here is a link to one being sold on Amazon.

9 SIMPLE WAYS TO PROTECT YOUR HOME FROM BURGLARS

You might not have a criminal mind, but think how a crook finds the perfect houses to target. An empty home in a neighborhood where people keep to themselves, no cameras or alarms, and dark or dimly lit structures, right?

A home security system can go a long way toward making your house unattractive to thieves, but there are more steps you can take to deter burglars. Here are nine tips you can implement right away.

1. Know your neighbors

Your house (and neighbors' homes) will be less attractive to burglars if the people on your street spend time on their porches, working in their yards or socializing outdoors. Neighbors who know each other look out for each other.

Make friends with the people on your street. If you trust them, you can ask them to help keep an eye on your house when you're on vacation.

You can check if there's a Neighborhood Watch program for your area. And if there isn't, maybe you should be the one to start it.

2. Install video cameras

A study found more than 60% of burglars would consider the presence of cameras or surveillance equipment when choosing a target. This is where a home security system comes in. Options for home security systems used to be very limited. You could deal with a local company with a complex and expensive system and pay a high price for monitoring services.

But now, there are easier and more affordable options which are intelligent, effective and don't tie you into

an inconvenient contract.

3. Close your doors and windows

The AIREF study also found most burglars either enter homes through unlocked doors or windows or force doors and windows open. Make sure you close and lock your doors and windows, even if you're leaving for work or going out on errands.

4. Reinforce your doors

A well-placed kick or crowbar can give a thief entrance into your home if your doors aren't sturdy enough to handle them. Check the length of the screws holding your door's strike plate and replace them with longer ones if needed.

You can also pick up a reinforcement kit to strengthen your door's jamb and lock area with metal plates. A solid security screen door can give you an added layer of protection.

5. Adopt a dog

Some thieves are wary of dogs and avoid homes where a barking animal is present. If you're a dog lover, this is one bonus reason to share your home with a beloved pooch.

6. Be wary during the day

While we usually think of burglars as sneaking around at night, break-ins often happen during daylight hours when the victim is gone at work or school. Be aware of this and keep your house buttoned up when you leave.

A sound home security system can alert you to suspicious activity in and around your house when you're gone.

7. Set up exterior lighting

There are many ways to keep the outside of your home from becoming shadowy where thieves can hide. Solar lights are easy to install and can come on automatically when it gets dark. Install motion-triggered lights around the exterior of your home or look into motion-activated solar lights for places where it's not practical to wire a light.

Don't forget your driveway. A motion-activated light aimed at your car can encourage potential vehicle burglars to move along.

8. Use timers

Lights, stereos and televisions can all be placed on timers and set to turn on at various times when you're not home. This can be especially helpful when you're gone on vacation and want to make it appear someone is at the house. Smart home

technology allows you to control your timers from afar.

9. Take care of your mail

You don't want mail to pile up at your home when you're gone, so arrange for a neighbor or house-sitter to pick it up. You can also ask USPS to hold your mail while you're away.

Make arrangements to delay any regular package deliveries you might have scheduled. If a package arrives while you're gone, have a neighbor or friend pick it up, so it doesn't sit outside your house.
