FEBRURARY 2025 TUTORIAL SIG

Those attending were Jim Hempel, Terry Harvey, Louise Dahms, Karen Fenney, Louise Bozek, Jan Mlagan, Margaret Cortez, J.J. Johnson, Richard Durand, Betty Zientera, Bill James, John Schwarzmeier, Bill Vlach, and Brian Behling.



Louise D was having problems with her video and had to back out and log back in a few times before everything was working properly. If you're having audio or video problems with Zoom, close the program and reboot your computer.

Karen just purchased an S25+, and Bill J has a new S25 Ultra with 1T storage! It's hard to imagine these small devices can have such mammoth storage capabilities. Both were purchased directly from Samsung, and were unlocked. If you purchase a phone through a carrier, the carrier will have blocked the locked phone from working with other networks. If you put a SIM card from a different carrier into a locked phone, you'll get an error message and the phone will not work. This is to ensure the carrier you will stay with them. Cell carriers offer phones with payment plans, which keeps you beholden to them, usually for 3 years. However, consumers often don't take into consideration the full cost of the phone due to low monthly payments and grossly overspend on a phone they may not be able to afford.



What is an Unlocked Phone?

Unlocked Samsung phones have many advantages, including more flexibility and the ability to use different carriers so you're able to choose the carrier with the best deals, network coverage, and features. Often, they will give you a discount if you return your old phone to them. They offer a cleaner software experience as they lack bloatware. Carriers preload unnecessary and useless apps on the phone using up its resources. You often get updates directly from Samsung before various carriers send them out. An unlocked phone is very travel friendly as you're able to use SIM cards from different countries. The resale value is often higher than a locked phone which is limited to its original carrier. The downside is the cost; you pay upfront for the cost of the phone; however, you often

get a better price than the total of the carrier's total monthly payments.

Disadvantages

A significant disadvantage of the unlocked phone is the carrier may not offer support should something go wrong. However, Samsung does offer technical support. You also receive a warranty from the manufacturer but claiming it can be a process. It's not as easy as walking into your local carrier and walking out with a different phone. You do have to have some technical skills. The big bugaboo for many is the phone has to be paid for in full at the time of purchase. While a credit card or other financing is an option, that would add greatly to the price of the phone. Unlocked phones are sold through the manufacturer's website, Amazon, eBay, Best Buy, Walmart, Staples, etc.



Louise B doesn't like the new Google AI responses while researching.

Bill advises using multiple sites to check the information as the AI answer is not always accurate. The AI response uses historical data to make predictions about the future, can misinterpret queries, and even incorporate false information into their summaries. Google admits its AI Overviews can generate "some odd, inaccurate, and sometimes dangerous" answers. Some have accused the results are hallucinations of AI, so scroll down on Google to verify the AI reply.

If you would like to turn off Google's AI feature on your Android phone, just go to the app's settings or your device settings. Tap Galaxy AI, select the services you want to disable, and tap the toggle to OFF. If your desire is to turn off the AI overviews in Google Search, open the Google app or your Chrome, Firefox, or Opera browser. Sign into your Google account. Tap LABS MANAGE at the top, toggle OFF "AI OVERVIEWS AND MORE."



Karen is wanting to clean up her old smartphone before using Smart Switch to transfer the data from her old phone to her new phone. She's finding she's not able to uninstall some of the apps, namely a SAMSUNG LED View wallet cover app. Karen really liked the wallet cover but sadly, after many experienced problems with the cover, it's

no longer made. First she should try going to SETTINGS, select APPS, locate the app, tap UNINSTALL, and tap OK to confirm. If that doesn't work, she should try to disable it before transferring her data. One last ditch effort would be to open the Play Store app, tap your USER ICON, tap MY APPS & GAMES, tap INSTALLED, tap the app you want to uninstall, then tap UNINSTALL. Upon further investigation it was thought it probably wouldn't transfer to the new phone as the wallet covers are no longer made. Should it show up on the new phone it should be able to uninstall it then.



Jan asked if Smart Switch would even transfer bloatware to the new phone. Smart Switch does not automatically remove bloatware from your old phone during the transfer process unless you specifically deselect them during the transfer process. Smart Switch does give you the option to choose ALL apps or which apps to transfer so this is another option for Karen.

Jim took us to a very interesting site at: <https://www.aarp.org/money/scams-fraud/tracking-map/>. This is a scam or fraud tracking map. You must have your LOCATION toggled to ON in order to see the scams in your area, and you will be surprised at how many instances of reports there are. You can warn others here if you've been scammed too. The site offers information about current scams, crypto confusion, and crypto fraud resources. AARP also offers an AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline at 877-908-3360 to speak with a Fraud Specialist. Remember, do not answer calls on your cell phone that are labeled SPAM or SUSPECTED SPAM. Do not purchase gift cards, under any circumstances, to be mailed to addresses unknown to you. Stay up to date with the latest scams. Don't give out any personal information but rather tell the caller you will call them back and look up the phone number of the agency on your own and return the call. If this is an unsolicited contact don't talk with them, if they try to pressure you into acting quickly, hang up. If it sounds too good to be true, it is so hang up. Be very vigilant and should you be caught off be sure and were actually scammed, contact your local police department's non-emergency phone number and send an email to <https://reportfraud.ftc.gov/>. Don't let embarrassment keep you from reporting. We all have weak moments and



make mistakes. It's important to report.



Next, Jim took us to a warning put out by the Cudahy Police Department. Their advice is: use strong, unique passwords for each site. Enable multi-factor authentication. Keep software updated. Use antivirus software. Protect personal information. Be cautious with links and downloads. Check website security before entering details. Avoid public Wi-Fi. Back up your data regularly. Be mindful of what you share on social media. Each of these points are so important.

Lastly, as Jim so often likes to do, a little quiz or humor before we all sign off. We went to: <https://historyquiz.com/>, Here we played a quiz on early computers. It was very fun, interesting and enlightening. Who knew? If you're missing SIGs, you're missing it.

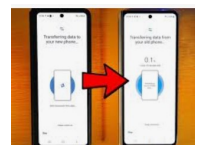
FEBRUARY 2025 Q & A SIG

We began the meeting with a comment by Julia who said her laptop got a software update and after that it did not present her with a box to sign in. She took it to her resident help desk in her apartment building. They told her the update probably affected her ability to sign in and they corrected the issue. After returning to her room, the pop-up password box was there and she could sign into her PC.

The next question dealt with the transfer of data from one Android to another. There are several ways to do this. But before you do it, you should take care of these few things first which will make the whole job a bit easier:



Charge both phones before the transfer. Update your old phone so it's running the latest OS – new updates could improve the transfer process. Check that you have all the login details for your apps, if not, you can usually reset them once you've made the switch. And clear out any old apps and documents that you haven't used for months and connect both phones to Wi-Fi.



 The most common method is to use your Google account to back up data on your old phone, then restore it on your new phone during the initial setup process; this allows you to transfer contacts, photos, apps, and other data seamlessly through Google Drive backup and sync features.

Another popular way is to use a cable. This is the quickest way to transfer all your data and is probably the simplest, particularly if you have a lot to move over. Remember, it's a good idea to first back up your files in Google Drive.



Go through the initial setup process of your new phone until you get to the 'Copying apps and data' screen. Click 'Next' at the bottom right. Then hit 'Next' again.

The screen will prompt you to connect your cable to your old phone. Then plug the other end of the cable into your new device. Click 'Copy' on your old device. Your new phone will show options of what you can copy across. When you're happy with what you've selected, click 'Copy'. Complete the rest of the set up and the copying process will begin. When the copying has finished, disconnect the cable.



Finally, if you have a Samsung phone, to transfer data from any Android phone to a new Samsung phone, you can use the Smart Switch app. You can connect the devices wirelessly or with a USB cable.

Open the Smart Switch app on the new device. Select Receive data. Select Galaxy/Android. Select Wireless. On the old device, select Connect to authorize the connection. Select the data to transfer. Tap Next to complete the transfer. As stated before, you may not want all the old data and you should clean up the old phone before starting all this. You may also want to only transfer your photos and then download fresh up

to date apps that you have been using.

Julia noted that her new phone has a lot of icons for games that she doesn't use. We told her that in most cases a long press on the icon will bring up a box with options. If you see Uninstall, click on it and it will be removed from the phone. Some apps won't allow it but may allow you to Disable it.

Then we got into a discussion of "bloatware" on phones. If your phone is purchased from the cell service provider, they may have pre-installed apps. The cell service provider gets paid to load these apps onto your new phone by the app developer. It's your choice to use them or lose them.

Uninstalling Programs



Another type of bloatware comes from the phone manufacturer. I found one study that compares the Samsung S22 to a Google Pixel 9. The S22 operating system is 32GB while the Pixel is 19GB. The Android operating system, OS, was developed by Google and the Pixel uses it in the original form. Other manufacturers, like Samsung, make changes and additions to it resulting in this larger format that includes their own bloatware. We had a question from Louise about apps running in the background. The group generally thought that is nothing to worry about. If you are, some phones have a way to identify those and even control them. On an older Samsung 9, go to Settings, Device Care, Battery and App Power Management. There you can activate the Adaptive Battery function and identify Sleeping apps and Deep Sleep apps.

On more recent Samsung devices, go to Settings, Battery, and look at the Power saving and the Background usage limits for help with background apps and sleeping apps.

From there we moved onto an article about a



recent change to Facebook. Meta is changing how **Live** videos are stored on Facebook, marking a major shift in how the platform manages user-generated content. Live being the key word here. A live video on Facebook is a real-time broadcast that you can share with your followers. You can go live from a profile, page, group, or event. Viewers can watch on any device with access to Facebook,

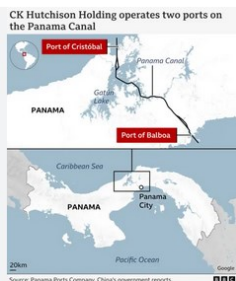
Starting Wednesday, new live broadcasts can be re-played, downloaded or shared from Facebook pages or profiles for only 30 days before they are removed. Previously, they were stored indefinitely.

The platform will alert users via email or within the app before a video is deleted, allowing users to download or transfer their content for up to 90 days. Meta has also introduced new tools to make the transition a bit easier, including the ability to convert videos into Reels or transfer them to cloud storage.

Since the Panama Canal has been in the news lately, and since the Geeks on Tour took a trip through it, we watched their short video on the trip through. Check it out.

After that Marcia showed us a video she personally took when going through the Panama Canal and how the locks work to get ships from the Atlantic to the Pacific oceans.



For those interested in smart video doorbell devices, we visited a website from PCWorld that offered reviews on several devices and buying advice. These included various manufacturers, models and functionality. For example, some make use of existing doorbell wiring to power them while others are battery operated.

A second PCWorld website discussed the smart door locks. It also offered tips on the large selection of locks, some with key pads, some turn knobs and key locks, and some with biometric abilities.



A question came up about viewing your phone on your computer and how to do it. On Win 10 and Win 11 computers, there is an app called Phone Link that can be used to show your phone on your computer moni-

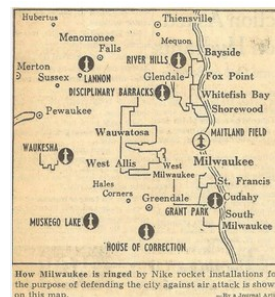
tor. You can see your photos, text messages, app icons and more. You can type text messages on your computer keyboard and see the results on your smartphone. It's a great app to try out. If you can't find it already on your computer, it is available in the Microsoft Store at no charge.



We closed with a short discussion on the new iPhone 16e which replaces the previous iPhone SE. We also looked at an explanation of IP codes that define how secure a device, such

as a smartphone, is to dirt, dust and liquids. Finally, we had a very short video about the large missiles that were protecting Milwaukee during the Cold War. If you missed it, too bad! Come to the meetings.

Are you having car troubles? Maybe this first video will help identify the issue. This video will show you how to use the website that can assist in diagnosing issues with your vehicle.

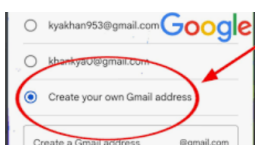

I had some things queued up for the meeting and we started with an item for

Hey, it's Free!

gamers. The website Hey, it's Free sends out emails about items that they find are free each week. This one was about free computer and smartphone games from Epic. We went over to their site to learn more about the free games of the week and the other features of the website. There is usually from one to three games for free. <https://store.epicgames.com/en-US/>



Until recently, many times we might find out damaged devices like smartphones need repairs. Often, they would have to be sent to the manufacturer even if there were competent repair places nearby. We are now seeing a change in

this. Now some tech companies including Apple and Samsung are taking important steps to improve the lifespan of devices by introducing refurbishment programs and even allowing you or a local repair shop to do the repairs, at least to some degree. https://www.cnet.com/tech/mobile/right-to-repair-milestone-is-a-win-for-tech-owners-everywhere-and-the-planet/?utm_source=iterable&utm_medium=email&utm_campaign=campaign_12750551&zdee=%5BContact.email_zdee%5D

We talked about this next item several times in the past. Net neutrality rules have been shot down again by the FCC and your service providers no longer have to treat all customers the same.

There has always been an interest in keeping our smart devices and computers protected from phishing, virus, malware and ransomware attacks. We reviewed an article and discussed the subject as it relates to computers with Win 11. Since Windows is so popular is has become a popular target and it's essential to have good protection for it.

The CNET article we reviewed stated "Windows 11 comes with Windows Security, which includes Microsoft Defender antivirus. Microsoft Defender (previously Windows Defender) is



automatically enabled when you set up Windows 11, so you don't have to do anything to ensure basic protection for your data. Microsoft Defender is also free, making it the best antivirus option for most Windows users."

For most users, that may be all you need. But it does lack some privacy tools found in other products. It does not have a Bank Mode, VPN or password manager. Some members were using freeware and/or paid versions of alternate software for their PC's as well as other smart devices. These included Avast, AVG, Bitdefender, and McAfee. In other news, Alexa is going to be powered by generative AI and will be called Alexa Plus. It promises a smarter, more conversational, approachable -- and most importantly, proactive -- virtual assistant. According to the article in CNET, the new generation of Amazon Alexa, called Alexa Plus, can book dinner reservations, set reminders on your calendar, order and send gifts to loved ones, and learn your routine and likes and dislikes over time to better serve you and those in your household. But as with the "classic" Alexa, privacy will surely be a thorny issue with Alexa Plus, and one should probably think twice before allowing the AI to scour sensitive documents like health or financial records.

Another news item came from DirecTV. They are launching a slate of new streaming only bundles priced between \$35 and \$40 per month. You can choose from three main pack options. For example, the MyEntertainment pack will be able to access over 40 channels, such as, Bravo, FX, E!, Food Network, basic Disney Plus and Hulu.



The very familiar Geeks on Tour have a 10-minute video called Editing with Google Photos, Fun with Photos. In this video we saw Chris take pictures that are crooked and straighten them and

ones that are dark and lighten them. Google Photos comes in three flavors. There is the app version available for the iPhone and for the Android smartphones and the web version you can use on a computer. Another benefit of Photos is that it can open up space on your smartphone by simply saving the photos in the cloud. Then those photos will be available on your smartphone, your tablet and your computer. Any changes you make on any device will also be available on the other devices.



After this introduction, she took a photo with some clutter in the background and demonstrated a simple crop technique.

In one of the examples, she selected a picture of a sunset on the beach, but it had two people in the background. You could crop the picture to remove them but takes away part of sunset. The better option is to use a feature called the Magic Eraser. She also pointed out the Revert option that brings up the original if you change your mind.

The Magic Eraser is only available on smartphones, not

on the web version of Photos. So she opened Google Photos on a smartphone and selected this photo. To bring up the Magic Eraser, tap the Edit, then tap Tools and finally Magic Eraser. It quickly analyzes the photo and makes a suggestion for correction. It did this by presenting the photo with two people highlighted in a blurry fashion. Next, simply tap Erase All and those two people magically disappear and the area is filled in automatically to look like part of the scene. Finally, if you are in a picture and want to remove the entire background of *****everything and leave only your own image, you need to use your iPhone Photos or Android Gallery. Google Photos can't do this. Open the photo in either Photos or Gallery. Long press on your image until you can move it around. Lift your finger.



Then tap Save Image. The result will look like the second image with all background details gone.

More details are in this video. The process works similar in either iPhone Photos or the Android Gallery.
